# HERSTORY OF THE SALUTE

# The Salute to Outstanding Women is a major part of YWCA Mohawk Valley's HERstory

For 29 years, YWCA Mohawk Valley has kept to the tradition of annually honoring local women for their service to the community. Each year eight women are recognized for their devoted, selfless, unwavering dedication to humanity, whether it is through their employment, volunteer efforts, or both. Each of these women were presented for consideration as a nomination from a colleague, friend, or family member, who had wonderful reasons to bring this person to our attention.

All of the nominations we received presented wonderful stories about wonderful people. However, in the end our panel of judges could only select eight names. Today we honor these women for who they are, and for who they inspire other people to be.

Twenty-nine years is a longstanding tradition, but that is what makes up the fabric of YWCA Mohawk Valley. Longstanding commitment. Tradition. Unwavering dedication to our mission. A look back over the last nearly 130 years will present a picture of how devoted YWCA members and staff have been.

And it all comes down to this: we believe in women. We believe in their power and their strength and their intelligence and compassion. We believe in the balance they bring to the professional world, and the inspiration they bring to other women.

By the mid-1800s, women began realizing and vocalizing this very notion. They were intelligent. They were creative. They were capable. These women – our great-great-great grandmothers – began collectively acknowledging the value of their worth, the value of sisterhood, and the importance of a collective, unified comradery.

With this stirring, a national organization called the Young Women's Christian Association was founded, and with it, similar groups began developing around the United States. One of these groups began gathering right here in Utica, in 1870. They called themselves The Christian Women's Association, not to be confused with the national Young Women's Christian Association. By 1884, they joined forces with the national movement and renamed themselves the Young Women's Christian Association.

The women devoted to this organization focused on improving the quality of life for local women by teaching reading, sewing, and cooking; by showing them how to find employment; and by offering social events like afternoon tea and weekly dinners. There was another group of women just as dedicated to improving the quality of life for women. They were called Suffragists, and their goal was to ensure that all women were treated equal to men, and this could only start by winning the right to vote in elections.

By the late 1800s, the local YWCA was hosting lectures and presentations to educate the public on women's suffrage. Susan B. Anthony even came to Utica to speak, but was booed off stage. Finally, in 1917, New York did it. Women won the right to vote – three years before this right was acknowledged by inclusion into the U.S. Constitution.

This year we celebrate the New York State Centennial anniversary of women winning the right to vote, we celebrate the 29th annual Salute event, and we honor and welcome these eight incredible women into the YWCA Mohawk Valley Salute Academy.





Born in Sudan, Rasha found refuge in the United States in 2012, and now lives in Utica with her husband and three children.


While living in Sudan, Rasha attended and graduated college as a student of Environmental Science and Natural Resources. After graduation, she worked as a nutritionist for the Minister of Health in Sudan. She then moved to Egypt and worked as an activist for women's education. In Cairo, Egypt she operated a community center where members could go for help. Through her self-founded organization, she taught women Arabic as well as many other practical skills, such as henna tattooing, crocheting, and basic computer skills which they could then use to enter into the economic sphere and become more self-sustaining.

Rasha has continued her social justice work here in America. For more than two years, she has been the leader of a women's group at the Midtown Utica Community Center (MUCC) that meets weekly to study English in a conversational manner. In addition to providing the opportunity to study and practice English, this group brings together refugee women from the many different communities so that they may get to know one another. Rasha coordinates the study materials and volunteers as a tutor with this women's study group.

She is currently furthering her education at Mohawk Valley Community College, and is interested in eventually becoming a nurse. She also runs weekly with the community running group, Run Mohawk Valley International, and is an active volunteer at the Midtown Utica Community Center.

One final thought provided about Rasha was offered: "She truly embodies all that is good in the world and shines as a strong woman and example to the community."

# YWCA MOHAWK VALLEY

YWCA MOHAWK VALLEY provides life altering services and programs to women, children, and men living throughout Herkimer and Oneida counties, and even at times, beyond. These programs provide domestic and sexual violence crisis services including advocacy, counseling, shelter, and free 24/7 hotline access. We provide education, life-skill building, extensive support services, and a vast network of referrals to help people find the path they need to healing.

# Programs and Services include:

## **Community Education**

Providing violence prevention education in Oneida and Herkimer county schools, colleges, and businesses. In addition to domestic and sexual violence education, topics include dating violence, gender and sexual identity bias, and bullying.

#### **Domestic and Sexual Violence Crisis Services**

24-hour confidential hotline, information and referrals, case management, crisis counseling, support groups, residential services, and victim advocacy through legal and medical procedures. Our advocates are in the city courts and police departments of Rome and Utica, and throughout the rural areas, as well as in the Child Advocacy Center in Oneida County.

#### **Residential Services**

YWCA Mohawk Valley provides residential services to victims of domestic and sexual violence via our emergency domestic violence shelters, Hall House in Utica, and Lucy's House in Rome; and our transitional housing programs New Horizons Plus, and Willow Commons – the only program of its kind in a six-county region.

# **Sexual Violence Services and Child Advocacy Center of Herkimer County**

Crisis Services are provided to adult and child victims and secondary victims of sexual violence. Services include individual and group counseling, a 24-hour confidential hotline, and victim advocacy throughout all legal and medical procedures. Additionally, our child advocacy center is connected to a multi-disciplinary team to ensure the uniform handling of child abuse cases.
