Congratulations on completing your first year with us at Siena Heights University. From what I've seen it's been a year filled with positive experiences and we are glad you're here. You've had a full year of teaching, teaching innovation, curriculum development, scholarship and service. Program chair Bob Conlon has sent you a detailed letter, and I will comment on his thoughts as well as your self-evaluation.

Bob mentioned your teaching first and that is appropriate at Siena. We are first a teaching institution, so your value as a teacher is greatly appreciated. Bob comments on students feeling pushed, or challenged in your courses, and your ability to weed through nonsense. I found that when I visited your classes, students were engaged in the process with good focus. You were referred to as "expert – she knows her media" I "went to her show – she's an expert". Students described you as a professor willing to sacrifice her own time, and someone who does a good job at reaching non-art majors as well as majors. One students said that although your syllabus was a bit ambitious, you did a good job of adapting the schedule. The feeling was also expressed that you do a good job with international students.

Your course evaluations mirror what we saw and heard in your observation, and I appreciate your thoroughness in your narrative summary or those evaluations. This is an area that many faculty pass over, and it is true we can learn a great deal from those things students are willing to tell us

I appreciate and applaud your teaching innovation, especially the commitment to the 'green' classroom. The ink usage, clean up and recycling are all commendable. Other innovation includes large scale printing and interactive technology. You also continue to make the classes themselves your own with the use of new practices and current theory and technology.

Mad, you have also managed to exhibit, present, and attend conferences and it's an impressive list. Congratulations also on your published work "In & Around C". At Siena, you've been a regular attendee of program and division meetings, plus you've been a member of the new faculty committee.

Finally, I appreciate your list of goals for next academic year. This is an important section of your self-evaluation and I hope you know I will help you however I can. Some of your goals may require some funding, and others may require more time. Either way, you have my support!

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Faculty Evaluation: Mad Mohre. April 2015.

Mad,

Your first year here at Siena Heights is concluding, and you have made an impressive start. I will try to highlight your many successes within this letter, as well as a place for recommendations for improvements.

Teaching

All of your student evaluations are positive, and the class visit continued to bear this out. The students seemed engaged and interested, and their work reflected that they were getting both good instruction and good feedback.

The students describe you as "expert" — you know technique and history and can pass that along to them. They noted that you have a love for what you do, and were impressed that you continue your own work and research within the class even as you are working with them. Along with that, you still will sacrifice your own time, particularly outside of class, to offer them assistance or to talk about their ideas. Several non-art majors said that you were able to push them in good ways for them to find new things to do, and that made the class much more valuable and interesting for them. All of the students mentioned that you are very good at pushing for purpose and potential, that this came out in critiques but also personal conversation, and they added this was always done in a caring fashion. A number of the art students noted your ability to "weed out bullshit responses" which meant they had to think through things better and work more diligently, a trait they appreciated. It was also noted that you are a very good steward of resources, re-using and re-purposing materials, and that this was something they were learning simply by watching how wisely you did this.

The students are reaching the goals of the learning outcomes, and there is an obvious interest on their part to learn more.

You have also team-taught ART107 and ARG147. There is nothing but positive praise by those you have worked with, and your input has been a boon to the dynamics and effectiveness of those courses.

The Studio

You have done a marvelous job of introducing new processes and reconfiguring the workspace to accomplish this. Your proposals for further improvements are well thought through, necessary, and considerate of the budget. The studio has attained an atmosphere of being a place to go for "making". Students are excited about the new emphasis on books and simply being more able to "build" things. Having a more open environment has the potential for problems, but your suggestion of a lab assistant and also the ability to expand the supply budget may be two ways to keep this happening. The students seem to love the space more

than any other in the art building, and I think that is a reflection on the good work they are producing within the printmaking classes.

Improvements

A few students were concerned that the work and number of assignments for the classes is too heavy. As well as mentioning this on evaluations, some of them brought these concerns to you during the first semester. You were able to work with them, and make adjustments both then and in the schedule for the winter semester. The winter classes seemed to agree that the scheduling and load was reasonable and effective. It is very hard to write a class and anticipate the workload through the semester. Your ability to be flexible, but more so to listen to the student concerns and act upon them shows a real commitment to their learning experience, and also your ability to grow as a teacher. I encourage you to keep this flexibility within your schedule, yet remain firm in the expectation of student engagement and work ethic.

Mad, you have done a remarkable job as a first year professor, or even for a highly experienced one. You have shown a real compassion for legitimate student needs, and they have gained a respect and loyalty to you. Your enthusiasm has grown more visible as you have moved through this year, and your passion is an inspiration to them, even though sometimes it is a struggle to fan their own passions. They see your hard work, and thoughtful ideas, and I believe this is the best way to teach these, by setting an example. You have a great desire to keep on improving in everything you do, but know that your teaching has already reached a high level of success.

Your show here at the Klemm Gallery and your installation at Denison University highlights your incredible artistic gifts and ability to push your own work and ideas. Again, apart from demonstrating your talent and passion, it is a wonderful example to the students. Thank you for all you bring to the department.
